Rober frost was born in (1874-1963) in USA and lived in New Hampshire. He was also famous in England, where his first two books were published. His poems are particularly concerned with real situations, the rustic life of the countryside and landscape. The poems, though they appear simple on he surface, are actually very thought-provoking. They follow his own view on poetry that a poem 'begins in delight and ends in wisdom'. This may be the reason why he refused to do any experiment with free verse and wrote in traditional styles. He was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for poetry four times – in 1924, 1931, 1937 and 1943. His first book of poetry, A Boy's Will, was published in England in 1913 with an introduction by Ezra Pound, as no American publisher had accepted it . His well- known works are North of Boston, New Hampshire, Westrunning Brook, A Further Range and Complete Poems.

Frost's consciously uses the technique of making descriptions of everyday situations or events symbols of profound truths. 'The Road not Taken'is charcterised by Frost's usual simple style, that is maked by ordinary, straightforward language, great emotional restraint and understatement.
